


The Annual Police Report for the City of Sparta, for the period of January 1st through December 31st, 2018, is herewith submitted for your review.

The staff did a great job compiling the 2018 data, so the report would contain important information plus be entertaining to read. The report contains a yearend review of the entire department.

As you review this repot you'll notice the following:

- Overtime hours decreased by 241 hours
- Calls for service decreased by 1,516 calls
- Drug related arrests increased by 8%
- Crimes against Government decreased by 1%
- Traffic citations decreased by 453 citations
- Use of Force incidents decreased by 2 incidents
- Crimes against children increased 1%
- Juvenile citations increased by 3%
- Proactive Police services increased 2%

The future demands and challenges of local Police Departments are constantly changing and growing, as you can see in the news. The Sparta Police Department is always striving to be innovative and forward thinking. Partnering with other agencies and community organizations is very important to the Sparta Police Department's mission, so we can better serve the residents of the City of Sparta. 





Allocation of Services






Arrest Percentage By Type of Crime


Municipal Offense By Type




UOF by Type




2018 Suspect/Officer Injury Ratio




2018 Alcohol Usage Factor








Traffic Citation Percentage By Type of Offense




Traffic Stops Warnings vs Citations





Five Year Traffic Crash Trend






Drug Arrest and Citation Percentages By Type of Offense




Sparta Políce Department 2018 Drug Report

For the purpose of this report, a "drug seizure" is an incident in which an illegal substance or drug paraphernalia as defined under WI Statutes Ch. 961 and Ch. 450 was seized, located, or recovered and taken into police custody. Data in this report has been compiled from SPD's record management system and evidence tracking program with information provided by the reporting officers. Illegal substances have been primarily tested and identified using presumptive field tests, although some have been confirmed from the Wisconsin Crime Lab.

Offender Demographics


In 2018, 250 individual offenders were cited, arrested, or were referred to court for drug-related offenses. Thirty subjects were repeat offenders. Offenders' age ranged from 14 to 62 years old with the average age of an offender being 29. The majority of all drug offenders, 69%, were males.

Frequency of Drug Type Seized




This graph shows the frequency in which officers seized a common specific drug and its related paraphernalia. Some cases included seizures of several different types of drugs.





How Officers Encountered Drugs




"Complaints" include calls originating from citizens, Probation/Parole agents, or another law enforcement agency. "Other officer-initiated activity" includes pedestrian checks, suspicious person/vehicle checks, or other actions initiated by the officers excluding traffic enforcement. Some search warrants were granted as a result of another call.

In regards to traffic enforcement, the Sparta Police Department averaged about 11 traffic stops per day. Drugs and/or paraphernalia were located in about 1 out of every 43 traffic stops the Department was involved in.

How Drug Seizures Were Processed

In 2018, 95 drug-related municipal citations were issued, and 155 offenders were arrested. By comparison in 2017, 112 citations were issued and 127 offenders were arrested. Drug citations can be issued for possession of marijuana, possession on synthetic marijuana, and possession of drug paraphernalia.



Only 37% of offenders in possession of just marijuana were arrested; many of whom had prior drug convictions and/or also had additional criminal offenses as well.

Methamphetamine

In recent years, meth has become increasingly popular within the area. Sparta PD has seen a nearly 18% increase in meth seizures from 2017 to 2018, and about a 27% increase since 2016.

A total of 89 different offenders were arrested or referred to the District Attorney for charges related to meth; compared to 65 offenders in 2017.

2018 Cítizen's Academy

2018 brought us the opportunity to host another Citizen's Academy. In fact we were able to host the largest Academy to date with 14 people attending. The academy is a platform we use to give those who attend the opportunity to learn more about the duties and responsibilities of the employees of the Sparta Police Department, and the day-to-day operations of the Sparta Police Department. The academy sessions began in September and ended in November with the majority of sessions occurring on Tuesday nights starting at 7 pm and ending at 9 pm. Tuesday night sessions included a visit to the Monroe County Dispatch Center, the Monroe County Jail, the Monroe County Court House (for a presentation by Judge Goodman and District Attorney Kevin Croninger), the Emergency Vehicle Operation Course, a presentation on forensic evidence, a TASER presentation (always a crowd favorite), a demonstration provided by the canine handlers and their four legged (also always a crowd favorite). There were three Saturday session that included a range day, a presentation by Gundersen Air along with the Sparta Area Ambulance Service and the Sparta Area Fire District where attendees were able to run rescue equipment to cut up a couple of cars that were arranged to simulate a mock accident. The cars were donated by PER Towing of Sparta. The final hands on session met on a Saturday also and consisted of shoot-don't shoot scenarios where participants are provided with an air soft gun and conduct mock traffic stops where they are presented with a scenario where deadly force may or may not be appropriate. The academy ended with a family friendly dinner at Club 16 where Certificates of Completion and Sparta Police Department Challenge coins were provided to the participants. 
