On behalf of the men and women of the Sparta Police Department, it is my privilege to submit the Sparta Police Department's 2021 Annual Report. The Sparta Police Department is known for its high level of professionalism and community service. 2021 was no exception as we set even higher goals for excellence, integrity, and valor.

In 2021 the Sparta Police Department received grant funding to expand our training and equipment. The department received State Department of Justice funds to sponsor a regional law enforcement criminal interdiction training. This type of training is rarely offered in our area of the state and we welcomed the opportunity to host area law enforcement in our new facility for up-to-date training at no cost to their agencies. Because we hosted the training, we were granted first opportunity for our officers to attend. We also received funding for Computer Voice Stress Analyzer equipment and training. This equipment will be used by our specialized units, including narcotics and Internet Crimes Against Children, as well as patrol officers investigating various criminal activity. Two detectives and two sergeants will be trained to operate this equipment, which will benefit both our department, as well as surrounding jurisdictions.

During the past year our department strengthened its relationship with Next Steps for Change and our PAARI (Police Assisted Addiction and Recovery Initiative) program. The Sparta Police Department is committed to looking past the crime at hand, and searching for solutions to root causes. We understand that drug addiction is not just a large crime problem in our city, it is a complex issue that takes multiple approaches and resources to combat. Aside from the devastation addiction causes families, these addictions lead to other criminal activity in our neighborhoods. Our partnership with Next Steps for Change offers tools and resources for those we interact with during our law enforcement contacts. Our hope is always to make long-lasting, positive change where we can. Because of the positive outcome of this program, I was able to assist Next Steps for Change in acquiring grant funding to support their growth during 2021, as well.

2021 brought some large changes for our department. Most notable was our move from the existing police department on E. Oak St. to our new facility on Pine St. This move took several years of planning and construction, with our final move occurring in late July of 2021. As you know, the City acquired the old Lakeview School which was completely remodeled. With an addition that now houses our garage, as well as storage and maintenance space, the building serves the needs of the department and community in every way we planned.

Our technology improvements are evident around our new facility. You will notice the Mobile CAD dispatching system visible throughout the building. This helps keep staff aware of incoming and on-going calls throughout Monroe County at all times. An integrated camera system improved our interview capabilities, as well as the security of our facility. Our evidence processing area now contains safe and secure testing, drying and packaging equipment for officers. These are just a few examples of modernizations we were able to achieve in our new space.

Aside from our building, you may notice a change to our uniforms. In 2021 Sparta Police Department changed uniform patches, moving toward a simpler, more modern design. Within the new patch we incorporated our values: *excellence*, *integrity*, and *valor*. These values were identified by department members in 2020 as our core values – those that represent our organization's highest priorities and the heart of the Sparta Police Department and its members. By the end of 2022 all uniforms will carry the new patch on their sleeves.

It is truly my honor to lead the men and women of the Sparta Police Department. I hope you find this report interesting and useful. We are always happy to discuss any questions or thoughts you have. Please rest assured that your police department works hard every day to bring you the best law enforcement services possible – always striving for *excellence*, *integrity*, and *valor*.


Deputy Chief



COMPLETE. We moved into our new facility in July, 2021. The new facility better meets the needs of police department personnel, as well as the public. We have already hosted training for our department and other local agencies, as well as state-wide training.

2021 Officer Training

The Sparta Police Department rebounded quickly from the restrictions of the pandemic and continued to train in 2021. One of the major training events that occurred was the department transition from .40 caliber pistols with conventional sights to 9 mm caliber pistols with red dot aiming systems. Our two firearm instructors, Sgt. Guralski and Sgt. Fischer, created and implemented an outstanding training program, which successfully transitioned and qualified our entire department with only two days of training for each officer.

With the completion of our new building in 2021, which includes a training room, the Sparta Police Department looks forward to conducting more in-house training at our PD, along with hosting trainings in cooperation with other entities.





Arrest Percentage By Type of Crime







Controlled Substance OWI's






Traffic Citation Percentage By Type of Offense



Traffic Stop Citations vs. Warnings





Our Code Enforcement Officer works on a part time basis and handles ordinance violations largely on a complaint basis. 2021 violations included *Unsightly Refuse, Excessive Grass Height, Junk/Abandoned Vehicles, Broken Glass on Boulevard, Storing Camper/Trailer on Street,* and other various violations. As you can see, the majority of property owners complied with a warning and request to take care of the violation within a given timeframe. A total of 6 citations were issued for code violations in 2021.

2021 Drug Report


For the purpose of this report, a "drug seizure" is an incident in which an illegal substance and/or drug paraphernalia as defined under WI Statutes Chapters 961 and 450 was seized, located, or recovered and taken into police custody. Data in this report has been compiled from SPD records and evidence management system with information provided by the reporting officers. Illegal substances have been primarily tested and identified using presumptive field tests, although some have been confirmed from the Wisconsin Crime Lab.

How Drug Seizures Were Processed

In 2021, 74 drug-related municipal citations were issued. Drug-related citations were issued for possession of marijuana, and/or possession of drug paraphernalia. A total of 179 arrests or referrals were made to the Monroe County Circuit Court on drug charges.


Offender Demographics

In 2021, 200 different offenders were found in possession of illegal drugs. We encountered 30 repeat offenders (within the year) and one offenders had six different cases. Offenders' age ranged from 14 to 72 with the average age of an offender being just over 33. The majority of offenders, almost 67%, were males.







How Officers Encountered Drugs



Five Year Trends










School Resource Officer

The 2020-2021 school year ended under COVID restrictions with students still using the cohort model. Students and staff were excited for the 2021-2022 school year and a chance to get back to normal. After beginning the school year not having to wear masks, masking was again required throughout the district. However, with masking in place, students were able to attend school five days a week and extracurricular activities were mostly back to pre-COVID scheduling.

As SRO, Officer Nelson attended regular school board meetings as they quite often became heated over the masking debate. For example, in September, one person was removed from a meeting after spraying the crowd with water while demonstrating their view on the effectiveness of mask wearing.

With the school schedule being mostly back to normal, Officer Nelson enjoyed being able to get back into classrooms and interact with students and staff on a more consistent basis. He could routinely be found reading to elementary kids or speaking to high school government classes or forensic science classes. He also attended sporting events and other events including homecoming, prom, and graduation.

Officer Nelson also had the opportunity to teach CPR and *Stop the Bleed®* classes to high school students. The ability to teach high school aged students basic lift-saving skills is a highlight and




















K-9 Unit

As the lingering effects of COVID-19 started to dwindle throughout 2021, our K9 Unit was able to move back into the swing of things and continue training at least twice a month with our regional training group. Even with the impacted schedule in 2020, both K9 Kaiser and K9 Nash were able to overcome the strict standards set forth by the North American Police Work Dog Association (NAPWDA) and certified as dual-purpose canines.

K9 Kaiser



K9 Kaiser (pictured above) is now the eldest working dog in Monroe County and the second eldest dog working in the regional canine training group. Although starting to mix some more grey into his beard, Kaiser is still in great health and assisting officers when time permits.

Community

During 2021, the Sparta Police Department K9 Unit has several encounters with the public to include- our annual K9 Unit Golf Outing, Theisen's Touch-a-Truck event, contact with local businesses, and Officer James and K9 Nash's encounters with patrons in the downtown district during nightshift.

K9 Nash

Although young, full of energy, and quite meticulous with his drug work, some areas of concern were discovered with K9 Nash. Officer James spent numerous hours training with K9 Nash and working with the vendor, Working K9 in Canada, but the determination was made to exchange K9 Nash for a new canine. The vendor was more than accommodating and exchanged the canine essentially free of charge. We anticipate our new canine, K9 Ronin, will begin with the department in April of 2022. We would like to thank K9 Nash for his service to the department, and welcome K9 Ronin!

Facility Dog Xanthos

Xanthos is our facility dog, serving several purposes for the department. He resides primarily at the police department, going home with his handlers for time-off when no handler is on duty. While wandering the station, Xanthos can be a playful distraction or calming interaction for our officers. When he puts his vest on, he knows it's time to work.

In 2021 Xanthos was deployed for various tasks. He sat with several children during interviews for child abuse or sexual assault. He was a companion for adult victims during their interviews or statements. Xanthos made friends at Sparta Schools while visiting hallways and classrooms, and went to community events to interact with as many people as possible.




2021 Defensive Action Comparison Report

During 2021 the Sparta Police Department responded to over 18,500 calls for service. In the multitude of contacts our officers have with members of the public on a day-to-day basis, and the hundreds of physical arrests that were made during the year, officers only utilized any type of "force" 32 times in 2020. The suspect was actively resisting officers in 26 of those incidents (fleeing, attempting to escape, resisting handcuffing, etc.) and was assaultive toward officers in 6 of those incidents (kicking, striking, spitting, head-butting, grabbing for an officer's firearm, etc.).

You may notice this year's number is higher than in prior years. Some of this increase is explained by a new category of "force" added to our Defensive Action Report. This category is titled "other" and is used for circumstances not otherwise categorized within the report. This is a way for us to track any type of hands-on action that may not historically have been viewed as a use of force. It is typically used by officers in instances such as assisting EMS by holding a combative subject on an ambulance cot for emergency medical treatment, or assisting in the Emergency Room by holding an arm down for a blood draw when needed by medical staff. It may also be used in some other circumstances where an appropriate but otherwise uncategorized technique is utilized.


Once officers complete a Defensive Action Report, that report is reviewed by 3 supervisors. Supervisors have the option of forwarding the DAR to a Defensive and Arrest Tactics Instructor for further review. Following that review, recommendations for further investigation, discipline or training are forwarded to the Chief of Police if needed. A similar review would be done as a result of a citizen complaint regarding inappropriate use of force. In 2021 DAAT instructors completed one use of force review at the request of supervisors. One formal use of force review was conducted by another agency at the request of the Chief of Police. Both incidents were found to be justified uses of force. The Sparta Police Department received no citizen complaints regarding use of force.





Defensive Action Statistics


Injury Ratio




Alcohol and/or Drug Use by Suspect During Incident

2021 Day Shift Report

The 2021 year brought another year of considerable amount of change and movement amongst the Sparta Police Department officers and their assigned shifts. Dayshift consists of two sides, A and B, not including School Resource Officer Nelson and Detectives Kuen and Tovar. The sides work opposite 12 hour days from 6:00AM to 6:00PM.

Day shift and night shift also had several overlapping power shifts throughout the year. These power shifts provided extra coverage during the times of day when the city experienced the highest call volumes. Numerous officers worked all or parts of dayshift.

Calls For Service (CFS) slightly increased from the previous year, even though we still dealt with the effects of COVID 19. Here are just a couple of the cases Sparta PD dayshift officers handled in 2021.

MONROE COUNTY AXE HOMICIDE

On June 6th, officers assisted Monroe County with a disturbance call just outside the City of Sparta on Icarus Road where there were three victims that had sustained injuries from an edged weapon. Officers encountered the suspect outside the home with a rifle. The suspect had suffered a self-inflicted gunshot wound prior to first responders' arrival. The suspect was taken into custody.

HIT AND RUN OPERATING WHILE INTOXICATED

On October 21st, officers were dispatched to the corner of E Wisconsin St and East Ave for a hit and run crash. Contact was made with a witness who stated he did not witness the crash, but he heard it from a residence on Walrath St. He also gave a description of the location of the suspect vehicle. Contact was made with the suspect who parked the vehicle behind his residence to hide it. He admitted he drove the vehicle and had been drinking. The driver was placed through Standardized Field Sobriety Tests and arrested.



SUICIDAL PERSON ON THE BRIDGE

On May 5th, officers responded to a suicidal individual on the STH 16 (Rasmussen Overpass) bridge. A male individual was found sitting on the parapet with his feet over the side of the bridge. The male individual initially did not respond to officers, but after the subject was recognized officers were able to engage him in conversation. Officers were able to get the male individual to turn around and place his feet down on the bridge. He was taken into custody for a Chapter 51 evaluation.

ARMED SUICIDAL PERSON

On May 26th, officers responded to a suicidal individual in the Sugarberry Blvd trailer court. Contact was made with the wife of the subject who was inside the residence with him. An officer was able to speak with the subject over the phone who was intoxicated, complained of neck pain, and stated he was suicidal. An agreement was made where the subject exited the residence without the gun and was taken to the hospital.


WINDOW ENTRY DOMESTIC

On June 6th, officers were dispatch to a residence on Central Ave for a male individual who broke into his girlfriend's residence. Contact was made with the female victim outside the residence who stated she got into a Domestic with her boyfriend at a campground in Vernon County but the Sheriff's Department did not arrest the suspect. She stated she was home when the male individual forced an air conditioner into a first floor room and stated he was going to damage property. A key was used to open the lock on the front door of the residence, however, the door was still chained shut. Officers knocked and announced several times but the suspect barricaded himself inside. The front door of the residence was kicked in and the male suspect was taken into custody.

HIT AND RUN OPERATING WHILE INTOXICATED

On June 5th, officers were dispatched to a hit and run crash. The complainant was able to get a plate on the vehicle and officers went to the address to make contact at the suspect. As officers arrived the suspect walked into the residence and did not answer the door. Contact was made with another male party who answered the door and said his brother had possession of his truck. Contact was made with the male suspect inside the residence who pretended he was asleep on the couch just inside the door. The suspect refused Standardized Field Sobriety Tests and was arrested.


The Sparta Police Department night shift officers responded to 8,884 calls for service throughout the year. Some of the most notable calls include:

Impaired Driver Flees Officers

On March 2, 2021, a Sparta Officer observed the operator of a motor vehicle drive at varying speeds and strike a curb on Wisconsin St. The officer attempted to conduct a traffic stop on the vehicle for several traffic violations. The officer initiated a pursuit as the operator of the vehicle accelerated and continued to ignore the officer's lights and siren. The vehicle continued westbound on Wisconsin St and Highway 16 until Officers conducted a trained technique; a rolling roadblock. The vehicle eventually came to a stop and the operator was arrested for Operating while Intoxicated – 4th Offense, Operating while Revoked, Reckless Driving – Endangering Safety, and Fleeing an Officer. The operator was also cited for several traffic violations.

Stop Sign Violation Leads to Dad's "Stache"

On March 11, 2021, a Sparta Officer observed a vehicle fail to stop at the stop sign at the intersection of Tyler St. and Oak St. A traffic stop was performed and the officer noticed the driver's suspicious behavior during questioning. A K9 sniff was executed and the K9 alerted to the vehicle. The vehicle was searched and marijuana, drug paraphernalia, and prescription pills were located. The operator of the vehicle was arrested for Possession of THC, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Possession of an Illegally Obtained Prescription, and Felony Bail Jumping.



Intervening Pedestrian Run Over by Vehicle

On March 14, 2021, Sparta Officers responded to a hit and run crash involving a pedestrian. Officers arrived in front of the Wayside Tavern and found the pedestrian laying in the middle of the roadway. The pedestrian stated he observed a disturbance between a female and the driver of a black truck. When the pedestrian attempted to intervene, the driver of the truck took off and struck the pedestrian. The pedestrian suffered significant injuries. The driver of the truck fled the scene and was not located that night. The driver was referred to the Monroe County District Attorney's Office for 1st – Degree Recklessly Endangering Safety and Bail Jumping. The driver was also cited for Hit and Run – Causing Great Bodily Harm and Operating While Revoked.




Intoxicated Driver Rolls Vehicle

On June 16, 2021, Sparta Officers responded to a roll-over crash on Kent St. Further investigation determined the operator of the vehicle struck a parked truck and rolled onto its side. Several beer cans were located on the ground near the suspect's vehicle and inside the vehicle. The operator was also found to be intoxicated. The operator was arrested for Operating While Intoxicated – 3rd Offense and cited for Inattentive Driving, Operating without Insurance, and Open Intoxicants in a Motor Vehicle.

Impaired Driver Leaves Car in La Crosse River

On July 16, 2021, Sparta Officers responded to a report of a vehicle in the La Crosse River near Ben Bikin' Park. Upon arrival, officers found the vehicle unoccupied and partially submerged in the river. It was determined the driver failed to turn while driving north on Long Ct. as it approached the intersection of Walrath St. The driver of the vehicle was located in the 100 block of E. Oak St. after a Police K-9 was utilized to track the driver to that area using scent from a shoe left behind at the scene. The driver displayed signs of impairment and was taken into custody for Operating while Intoxicated – 1st Offense. The driver was cited for Failure to Keep Vehicle Under Control and Failure to Notify Police of Accident.



Pursuit Suspect Identified by Kwik Rewards Card

On August 22, 2021, a Sparta Officer conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle as it left Kwik Trip, after the registered owner was discovered to have a warrant for their arrest. The vehicle initially stopped but then fled from the stop as the officer approached the vehicle. The vehicle was located parked near a mobile home on Iband Ave. The driver was missing and an uncooperative passenger was located in the vehicle. Contact was made with the registered owner who was taken into custody for their warrant, however, they were later found not to be the driver of the vehicle. Officers returned to Kwik Trip to review store surveillance video in an effort to identify the suspect. Kwik Trip staff advised officers the suspect entered his phone number for his Kwik Rewards Card during his purchase, which they were then able to look up and identify a full name, date of birth, and address for the suspect. The suspect was referred to the District Attorney's Office for Vehicle Operator Flee/Elude Officer and Resisting an Officer. The suspect was cited for Exceeding Speed Zones, Operating after Suspension, Operating Left of Center Line, and Reckless Driving.

Consent Search Leads to Drug Arrest

On September 5, 2021, a Sparta Officer conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle for speeding. The officer noticed the operator of the vehicle was visibly nervous and shaking. The officer asked the operator for consent to search the vehicle, which the operator granted. During the search of the vehicle, marijuana, drug paraphernalia, and cocaine was located. The operator was cited for Operating while Suspended and Speeding. The operator was referred to the District Attorney's Office for Possession of THC, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia and Possession of Cocaine.

Impaired Driver Stopped After Being Warned Not to Drive

On October 5, 2021, Sparta Officers had spoken with an impaired subject at Kwik Trip after they

were called in for suspicious behavior. Officers observed the subject's vehicle at Kwik Trip and warned the subject not to drive until he sobered up. Approximately 5 minutes later, the subject was seen driving out of the parking lot and southbound onto Black River St. A traffic stop was conducted and contact was again made with the suspect, who staggered and displayed body tremors. The suspect denied any recent drug use despite clearly having a blue powder-like residue around their nostrils. The suspect was taken into custody for several charges to include Operating while Intoxicated – 1st Offense, Operating while Revoked, Possession of THC, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, and Possess an Illegally Obtained Prescription.



Stabbing in Sparta

On October 23, 2021, Sparta Officers responded to a reported stabbing in the 700 Block of E. Division St. On scene, officers were met by an uncooperative female who had severe injuries to her face and head. The female attempted to keep officers from entering her residence to locate a male party who had been stabbed in the stomach. Both individuals were eventually detained and transported to medical facilities by ambulance and helicopter due to the severity of their wounds. Once cleared medically, both individuals were arrested for numerous charges to include 2nd – Degree Recklessly Endangering Safety, Aggravated Battery – Intend Bodily Harm, Obstructing an Officer, Possession with Intent to Deliver THC and Cocaine, and Neglecting a Child.

Fire on Walrath Street

On November 19, 2021, Sparta Officers responded to a residential structure fire at 510 Walrath St. The residence, which was determined to be uninhabited, was completely destroyed by the fire. The Sparta Fire Department extinguished the fire and prevented the fire from spreading to the surrounding residences and a lumber yard. The cause of the fire is currently unknown.



2021 Police Reserve Unit

The Sparta Police Department Reserve Unit is made up of volunteers who are committed to serving the citizens of Sparta and improving the quality of life for all within the community. The Reserve Unit also augments the Sparta Police Department in times of emergencies and special events. The dedicated members of the Reserve Unit have helped the Sparta Police Department connect with our community in new ways.

The Sparta Police Department Reserve Unit participated in monthly meetings and trainings. Some of these trainings included: Professional Communication, Crime Scenes and Evidence Processing, Crowd Control, Traffic Control, and Responding to People in Crisis.

The Reserve Unit provided traffic and crowd control at the Memorial Day Parade, the Butterfest Parade, the Butterfest run/walk, the Butterfest Fair Grounds, Concerts in the Park, the House of Shadows, and the Annual Holiday Parade. The Reserve Unit also provided crowd control at several Sparta High School football games. In addition to providing traffic and crowd control, the Reserve Unit assisted the Sparta Police Department with the transportation of individuals placed on a Chapter 51 Hold to facilities throughout the state.

Thanks to monetary donations from the community, fifty elementary schoolaged children were selected by Sparta Area School District staff and invited to attend. The pair was given a Walmart gift card and the child was able to purchase Christmas gifts for themselves or others.

The goal of the event is to promote a positive relationship between the children and the heroes. We also hope to make the holiday season a littler brighter for area kids. As always, the Shop with a Hero event was a huge success.
